### **WORK ACTIVITY CENTER**

Welcome to the Work Activity Center, we are the heart of Document Destruction service at WCBA. This fiscal year (2019- 2020) we brought in 1,744,103lbs. of paper for shredding. That's over 872 tons! A large chunk of that paper came from walk -in customers. These are individuals or businesses whom drop off their paper to us. Those transactions brought in 119,871 lbs., almost 60 tons. Not too bad for closing the walk-in part of business for over 6 weeks due to Covid-19. Our consumers work very hard and manage to shred approximately 7,000 lbs. a day!

We recycled 1,480,631 lbs. of paper (over 740 tons) and we also recycle our cardboard boxes. We recycled 40,990 lbs. of cardboard (over 20.5 tons).

We also have hard drive destruction. This year we destroyed 441 hard drives. These hard drives get sent out to a local recycler for them to retrieve any worthwhile metals, etc. from them.

I want to thank personally; all of the consumers, direct care workers, warehouse men, and the two truck drivers whom go out daily to pick up our paper for us, you are ALL doing a TERRIFIC job!

Members of the ATF also participate in fundraising activities such as bake sales of chocolate covered pretzels and spaghetti lunches. Fundraising also enables the ATF to go on trips and participate in activities in the community.

Some of the activities that we offer in the ATF are exercise and music therapy, daily life skills, science experiments, literacy and math activities, arts and crafts.

To stay connected over the pandemic, Jenn and her ATF staff conducted Zoom lessons. They did a terrific job of interacting, exercising, reading and teaching our consumers.

### TEXTILE MANUFACTURING

WCBA's manufacturing department has been busier than ever due to Covid-19. We have been subcontracted to make 400 military masks PER DAY! WCBA's textile department made well over 14,000 masks and utilized our cutting machine to cut a whopping 2,000 gowns for Excela Health. In addition to manufacturing the masks and the gowns, we still make cold weather shirts, flyer kit bags, and Navy neckerchiefs for the U.S. military.
